This year we have ICAN and the 35th Purely Pastel Exhibition happening in May/June at Neilson Park Creative Centre in Etobicoke, ON. The planning was well under way last year and under Ruth Rodger's experienced and capable hands it looks like ICAN 2025 will be an excellent event. With 17 Instructors and 27 workshops plus a number of free events, there will be something for everyone.

Also at ICAN, PAC member Donna Roberts will have a merchandise table set up to display the new PAC and ICAN branded products. Orders placed before Apr. 30th can also be picked up during ICAN. I've already placed my order!

Earlier this year we launched the new PAC website giving us a more contemporary look and streamlined efficiency with upgraded security features. 

Who Do You Want to Be?

Subtitled: Relentless pursuit of improvement

Am I simply shaped by what others have made of me, or do I bear some responsibility for who I have become? Do I have talent or is it just time, practice, perseverance, dedication, or a combination of both?

I've often heard people blame their upbringing—like having judgmental parents, insecure friends, or a lack of encouragement—as the reason for their current selves. We can blame upbringing, societal expectations, and self-doubt—and use these factors as excuses instead of striving to become who we truly want to be.

Talent, to me, isn't something that simply exists as a natural gift that defines who we are. Talent is like a seed, something that holds potential. Nurturing that seed that brings it to life. Without practice, perseverance, and dedication, talent remains dormant, never fully realized.

Such is true in life as well. We don't get better by simply acknowledging who we want to be. We get better by dedicating ourselves, by practicing even when (or especially when) it feels like we're not making progress.

Talent is only one part of the equation. It's the spark, the initial idea or ability that can lead us somewhere, but it doesn't guarantee success. True artistry comes from the relentless pursuit of improvement, from failing and learning, from showing up every day and putting in the work—even when it's hard or frustrating.

When I think about my journey as an artist, I realize that what truly defines me is not the talent I was born with, but the hours I've spent honing my skills, pushing through self-doubt, learning from others more experienced, and striving to create something meaningful. It's the commitment to my vision and the courage to continue despite setbacks. Talent may give us a head start, but it's our work ethic, our passion, and our belief in our potential that will carry us across the finish line.

Talent can be nurtured, and it's only through the daily practice of our craft that we transform it into something truly extraordinary. So in life, to become who we want to be takes a willingness to keep going when things get tough, to keep learning and growing, and to never give up on the dream, no matter how long it takes.

Who do you want to be? What kind of person do you want to be? What do you aspire to? I want to be an author. I want to be an artist. I want to write children's books. I want to make those around me proud of who I am. Creating art and writing makes me feel proud of myself and helps me to feel good about myself. Writing and creating art allows me to keep my head up and walk steadily toward an unknown future instead of looking down and trudging forward.

We all have preconceived notions about who our parents want us to be, about who our friends think we are, and about who we are supposed to be. One



of my preconceived notions is that no one wants to hear what I have to say. Does what I think matter? Can you hear me? Is anyone listening to what I'm saying? So sitting at this keyboard is a small step to say my piece and step out in Faith.

We are responsible for shaping our path, rather than simply accepting the influences around us. The idea of taking small, consistent steps towards our goals is key—sometimes it's easy to feel overwhelmed by the idea of becoming someone new, but every action, no matter how small, propels us forward.

In art, we learn by observing. While everyone begins with preconceived ideas, as you evolve, it's essential to see beyond them and envision how we want to grow. To do good art, we must lay aside our preconceived ideas—a tree has green leaves— and look and be able to see the depths of the colours, the darks and the lights, the contrasts. So it is in life. To live a good life, we must be able to embrace the depths of our feelings, the good and the bad, the ups and the downs. Only then can we become who we want to be, who we were meant to be.

Both life and art require us to look deeper—past the surface, past what we're told is expected, and beyond the limitations we place on ourselves. 

Breaking Through the Weight of Clouds

- 1. Breakthrough: after many attempts at representing clouds, and how light they are, I gave up, started playing about and with a very light touch, created "Breakthrough", which I have kept to remind me to keep experimenting!
- 2. Swampland: one of the few images that I consider a successful "abstract". I usually end up including "too much information" into my images and have been working on more abstraction, though always with the baseline being "landscape".
- 3. After the Wildfire: Part of a series of images I have done since last year, in making sense of the vast changes to our landscape (including almost up to our back door) when a wildfire surrounded

our community. There is still beauty after disaster; it is only when the context is shared, that people may be conflicted- i.e. "but this was a horrible event- how can there be any beauty to see?"... Having worked for several decades in emergency management and supporting rural communities post disaster, I have had the opportunity to see what happens; then see the afternath, when nature (always) rises again in many ways.

Sunshine Palette Mexico with Margaret Ferraro

In March 2025, Ferraro art workshops travelled to Nayarit Mexico, to taste, observe, enjoy great weather, create paintings, and enjoy the laughter and creativity of other like minded artists.

We started our adventure in Puerto Vallarta, where many exciting subjects started to pop up everywhere, before we even made it to the retreat. If you know how to compose, painting images are everywhere. Sometimes you have a photo shoot, other times, it's a 3 hour painting opportunity.

It was exciting meeting everyone at our Hotel, Posada de Roger. For me, it was wonderful, having many students who have been on many of my trips, mixed with completely new people, from Ontario to B.C.


After being over-stimulated in Puerto Vallarta, we made our way by bus around the coast, to our retreat for the next 9 days, Casa Buena Art Retreat.

When I look back at the many art trips I've done since 2008, to many counties: France, Italy, Portugal, Spain, Peru, Costa Rica, and now Mexico, I think the most exciting moment, is landing at our new retreat, where we will spend the majority of our time. Such was the case in arriving at Casa Buena. After a tour, the flurry of rooms assignments, and a bit of a rest, we were ready to get going on why we came to this place, to paint.

What I was interested in for this trip, was what would the experience be like without getting into vans most days, but to be able to plan out the execution of your ideas each day without a lot of interruptions. That's what we're after. With the ocean very close, and a pool at our disposal, it was very easy to fall into a routine of up early, breakfast, and out to paint. Early morning saw people out with the cameras and phones, catching the longer shadows and subtle light effects of that time of day.

I encourage simple compositions for the beginning of our trip. To start simple is to flow, and get a few pieces under your belt without a lot of angst. Being warmed up leads to more enjoyment as we gradually work into more complex pieces.

Setting a pace that allows the artist to work



There's definitely a trajectory of lessons, focus and work, mixed in with other fun activities to allow us to maintain good creative energy. You must fill that cup, art is the overflow.

I start my trips with a review of how to create a thumbnail, as a representation of each idea you have for a painting. Mastering thumbnails saves so much time in the long run, of identifying which ideas will make for the best paintings. In this world of photo reference and tracing, plein air painters I regard as the most brave, painting what is right in front of them, interpreting 3 dimensions into 2. I review drawing lessons always, and like to get that in at the very beginning to establish a conversation about the importance of good drawing technique. Once thumbnails and drawing lessons done, we're moving right into prepping for a full pastel painting, on pastel paper, or with under paintings on watercolour paper.

We enjoyed perfect weather while away, painting in the mornings, lunch, then a bit more painting with everyone eventually in the pool each day by 4:30, or before. It's a rough life.

Mostly we enjoyed painting at the retreat, with one day at a beach that gave us mountain views on one side, and a river and many other compositional scenarios on the other. Painting at the beach brought up the typical challenges for people painting on location. Stimulation of every form. Luckily there weren't too many people at the beach while we were there, but the noise of the ocean, finding shaded areas to paint, the wind, sun were some of the things we dealt with. One has to

experience these stimulations many times to get a handle on keeping your focus on your painting and composing.

The first night we were there, I started preparing my students for sunset challenge, by taking that one night to talk about the sunset, an ongoing conversation about how the colour changes, how fast it happens, what's different if there's clouds, the intensity or softness of colours, the reflections on water, so much to observe. This made the next night and subsequent nights very easy to follow a repeat process of quickly changing scenery and only being able to capture it fleetingly. This is the essence of plein air painting, and what we call,

sunset challenge.

In the evenings we had some slide shows of pastels work from around the world, that pertained to what we were painting, skies, sunsets, flowers, and always the problems with greens.

Still life was also a part of this experience. I set up a new still life every day, featuring mexican pottery, fruits, colourful handiwork and flowers. So there was never a shortage of subject matter. We overflowed with ideas. The goal is to have too many ideas, and learn the practise of prioritizing your most inspiring ideas. to never run out of ideas! And, to keep my artists excited and motivated.

A one hour painting, start to finish...

Haliburton School of the Arts, Haliburton Ont. Pastel Painting, course code ARTS1100 Monday June 9-Friday June 13

This class is a solid foundation in the basics of Soft Pastel. We begin the week with a day studying pastel application techniques.

We take each technique, one by one. I demo it, show you paintings using each technique in many samples from around the world, and then the student produces samples. It's a day of studying applications techniques and experimenting with colour.

We do some colour theory, and more practise of good technique, like studying values, working hard to soft pastels and layering. Then we start learning the preparation process for a complete painting in several subject matter: still life, landscape, florals.

On the third day, people start working independently, using my individual study boards.

From there on, students work independently, including some on location painting. If people have some ideas of things they wanted to do in class under supervision, they can do these near the end of the week.

Everyone is encouraged to work at their own pace.

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





The show is from June 4 to 26th.


I look forward to showcasing the amazing medium of pastel through my students here in BC with daily demos from both students and myself.


