Profile of an Artist Wilma Mehl PAC



"The Man in the Moon"

Wilma, a 44-year-old artist born and raised in Frankfurt, Germany, comes from a family with a deep appreciation for art. While surrounded by creativity from a young age, she only recently embarked on pursuing her artistic talent professionally.

In 2011 she moved with her husband and son to Lambton County (Ontario). Although she explored various artistic paths over the years, it was in 2020 that she fully committed to her art journey, challenging herself to master pastel painting. The vibrant colours and unique textures of pastels drew her in, leading her to focus on representative pieces that celebrate local landscapes and seascapes.

Wilma has participated in several exhibitions, showcasing her original works and in local galleries and businesses, with waves being a recurring theme inspired by Lake Huron.

In 2023 her career dramatically changed when she won the Panel's Choice Award at the Art Comp in London, Ontario.

The emerging artist became a member of the Pastel Artists of Canada (PAC) society in 2024.

This year marks a significant achievement for Wilma:

The self-taught artist will host her first solo exhibition at the Lawrence House in Sarnia.


Showcasing Excellence. Pastel artists.CA Annual Exhibitions



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

What have you been up to?


Rae Smith, PAC

I also belong to the Contemporary Art Society in Halifax, about 50 members, this is our 50th year, we have an annual juried Art show of about 100 paintings, I had three pastels accepted, that's the max, one won a ribbon, it sold and is now in Toronto, painting of a gate House.

The year so far has been busy with live and online workshops.

I bought Marla Bagetta's "Next Level Animals" course and so far am having fun and selling my rooster paintings. Who knew you can paint with pastels on watercolour paper, with just an acrylic and Indian ink underpainting? I was doubtful since not a sanded

surface, but it works.





It was a busy few days at ICAN, Susan Typert's fun and challenging "Paint from your Gut" session (included a timer) and Clarence Porter's "Colour Crazy" all day workshop (managed to forget my pastel box but everyone was so kind and offered loaners). Not having my usual colours with me, it was rewarding to try a limited palette and actually framed 2 pieces when I got home.

I did an online workshop through Penn Studio School of Art, Susan Woolgar's "Acrylic Underpainting with Pastels" in which we also learned how to make our own pastel paper. Susan has a fun teaching style and we learned more than just underpainting techniques.

Also, did an online session with Richard Stuckley through the Winslow Art Center, "Fast, Loose and Uninhibited with Soft Pastels and Mixed Media Techniques". Richard has experimental approaches that combines of t pastels with water-based media crushed, sprinkled, splashed, and dragged—to unlock textural and visual possibilities.

I entered and had 2 pieces accepted into the Picton, Ontario, Art in the County juried art show. See below. In addition to all this, I belong to Picton's Arts on Main Street Gallery, a cooperative gallery with 23 members. Our shows change over every 3 months. My focus this year has been atmospheric skies, although my sales in June included 2 roosters and a neighbour's barn.

The Figure Drawing Club, Group of 77, has been selected as the Official Reportage Artists for the 2025 Canada Games for most of August!

I am thrilled about the entire idea. I love crowds and this will take me back to when I drew portraits in Pastels 10 hours a day every day for Expo'67 and Terres des Homme in 1968. That total immersion is where and when I developed my chops. I love that activity and still do it for Fund Raisers, weddings, etc. for the pure joy of it.

I feel total freedom in such events to pastel in any way the model inspires me to.

Even in China as their guest I was drawing pastel portraits of the Provincial Premiers and their cabinets.

In this case we are not necessarily doing portraits but instead reporting anything of the games. Each artist chose a minimum of 3 sports. I chose more than that.

Speed will be a major requirement so at will I will use pencils, pens, markers, AND soft pastels. This is a voluntary activity so supplies, especially pastel paper costs, will certainly be a challenge for me. I think I must buy some of the pastels and markers for the competitors' shorts, bibs, etc.

My confirmed sports are Kayak, Golf, Beach Volleyball, Mountain Bike, Rugby Sevens, Athletics and Wrestling and I am already dreaming of creative angles, colours, gestures, the surroundings and various situations in the crowds.

Later, I learned to sew with my mother. I always had a project to work on. Later when I moved to BC in 1995, I was amazed by the beautiful abundant nature! I learned watercolor with a friend and took many workshops and loved it.

About a year ago another friend introduced me to Catherine Sheppard, a very talented pastelist. At the first workshop I wanted to paint my 2 cats when they were kittens. They are still one of my projects to complete.

I was very slow to absorb the technic. A month after I went to another pastel workshop with other artists and I was so happy to accomplish my first pastel painting! A beautiful Macaw parrot. That was it! I fell in love with Pastel; this was my new passion.

I love to see the painting taking life after putting the base with the pan pastel, using tools to make it smooth and going back with the pastel pencils for details.

I learn with every painting. I started with feathers for the parrot. The fur for a wolf applying the base with pan pastel and returning with the pencil to follow the movement of the fur.

I painted a beautiful Chevrolet Belair 1957 with California coast scenery. Every little detail is important so, like Catherine suggested, starting

at one corner and making my way down was a big help, otherwise I was getting lost. I love the results; my car is beautiful!

The challenge I had was to paint copper pans. I was amazed by the results with different colors to create the shine. I also learned to create reflections in the water with a beautiful swan.



To date, one of the hardest pieces I have ever attempted. The majestic male Silverback gorilla. He is distinguished by the silvergray hair on its back and shoulders, which develops as they mature, typically around 14 years old. There are dominant males in a gorilla group that play a crucial role in leadership, protection, and social dynamics.

I chose the dark grey pastelmat base and used black gouache for all black areas using a 0 size brush. Gouache does not work on Sennelier or some other pastel base material, but works wonders

on pastelmat.

This black gouache will stay put so you must get it down correctly as you can

This process helps when your art has many lines and wrinkles in it like this one does.

not erase it.

Pan pastel for the base, then build up using pastel pencils for all the detail.

The gouache is by Danielle Smith or Windsor & Newton as you can reconstitute them after they have dried out.

The Illusion of Novelty in Art: A Reflection on Toulouse-Lautrec

By Andrea's Perspective

"In our time there are many artists who do something because it is new; they see their value and their justification in this newness. They are deceiving themselves; novelty is seldom the essential. This has to do with one thing only: making a subject better from its intrinsic nature."

— Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec



These words challenge a common belief in the art world today: that an artwork must be original to be valuable. Artists often chase novelty—avoiding subjects that seem too familiar or already done. I know this well. I've often dismissed what's in front of me because it didn't feel new enough. But in doing so, I've overlooked the deeper richness of the subject itself.

Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec, born in 1864, lived only 37 years, yet his legacy is extraordinary. A French painter and illustrator, he began exhibiting at 21 and, in less than two decades, produced over 700 paintings, 275 watercolors, 363 prints, and more than 5,000 drawings. He even painted a pastel portrait of Vincent van Gogh in 1887, now in the Van Gogh Museum in Amsterdam. Beyond his prolific output, it's his clear and consistent artistic voice that endures.

Lautrec wasn't drawn to novelty for its own sake. He believed the value of art lies not in its originality, but in its ability to reveal something essential about its subject. The artist's job is not to invent, but to see—with clarity and care.

Andy Warhol also embraced this idea. By turning the ordinary—like a soup can—into iconic art, he blurred the line between fine art and popular culture. His bold style gave everyday objects new life, not because they were new, but because he brought something new to them.

This perspective runs counter to our culture's obsession with innovation. Yet both Warhol and Lautrec show us that art doesn't need to shock to matter. Often, the deepest beauty lies in the familiar—the light on a table, a glance between people, a quiet landscape.

As I continue my practice, I'm learning to release the pressure to be constantly original. Instead, I'm finding meaning in what already exists, trusting that close observation and honest expression are enough. My role isn't to impress, but to reveal the wonder that's already there.

Lautrec's insight is both a challenge and an invitation: to move past the illusion of novelty and engage deeply with what's real. In doing so, we may create not only better art—but become better observers: more present, more truthful, more human.


